We held our Annual Meeting, entitled "Practice-Based Research in a Changing World: Building Capacity to Address the Urgent Needs of Diverse Communities", by Zoom on September 30, 2021. Many of you have asked for access to a recording. The morning session focused on academic/community practice-based research partnerships, including a panel of prominent bay area community-based health systems leaders discussing what works, what doesn't and what's needed. The afternoon session included a keynote on social determinants of health and health equity and a panel of how social needs are being addressed in bay area primary health care systems through research, education and action. Recommendations for Equitable Vaccination Rollout for Older Adults:

While the majority of older adults in our communities have already been vaccinated, there is still much to be done to be assure vaccination opportunities for those who are socially isolated, or who have limited English proficiency, or who belong to communities of color with other reasons for poor vaccine access. SFBayCRN steering committee member **Leah Karliner**, who also directs the UCSF Center for Aging and

Research Findings on COVID-19 and Anti-Asian Racism

The persistence of anti-Asian hate and discrimination in our Northern California communities has been extremely disheartening. SFBayCRN steering committee member Van Park, along with colleagues Linda Park and Janice Tsoh have call our attention to findings from their COVID-19 Effects on the Mental and Physical Health of AAPI Survey Study (COMAPSS). Results from this national study were recently shared with the Congressional Asian Pacific American Caucus (CAPAC) and include the alarming finding that 3 in 5 respondents experienced discrimination in the past 6 months. 41% said that they have experienced more racial discrimination since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic.
